distribution and a new arrangement was entered into with the professional commercial filmstrip producer, Victor Kayfetz Productions of New York. 1)

Between 1950-52, nine filmstrips in black and white dealing with Shabbat and the various festivals were brought out (2). These ranged in length from 42 to 74 frames, with an average length of about 55 frames. This was followed in 1953 by a cartoon filmstrip entitled "The Jewish Home". Since this date no further filmstrips on religious knowledge have been produced by the JEC of New York, although they have produced them in other spheres of Jewish Knowledge (3). This organisation provides "educational leadership and service to Jewish schools of all ideologies (Orthodox, Conservative, Reform and Secular), and to the Jewish Community." (4) Some frames in their filmstrips depicting Synagogue Scenes were taken inside Park Avenue Synagogue which is Conservative.

The Bureau of Jewish Education of Los Angeles produced its first filmstrip on religious knowledge in 1951 with some black-and-white filmstrips dealing with the Seder (5). Some colour filmstrips dealing with Shabbat and Shavuot, which were designed for young children then followed (6). The members of this Bureau "represent every shade of opinion in the Jewish Community-Orthodox, Conservative, Reform, Zionist, Labor-Zionists and Secular Yiddishist" (7). Accordingly, where appropriate, they produce a traditional and Reform version of the same item. The colour filmstrip "The Book that cannot be Printed" was first produced in 1952 and an improved print of this edition was released in 1955 (8). In 1959, they brought out the colour filmstrip "Three Sacred Objects of Judaism".

This filmstrip consists of 59 frames, all of them in black and white. Of these frames 32 are photography, 11 art works and the re-mainder introductions, words of songs etc.

Two copies of a narrator's script accom-pany this filmstrip.

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This filmstrip shows the celebration of Shabbos in the home and synagogue and also illustrates the week of creation.

Frames

1—4 Introduction captions.

5—10 "Open Week in a School" illustrating a study of Slabbos.

11—12 Flash cards to learn Chumash translation.

13—23 Illustrations showing the week of creation (e.g. creation of heavenly bodies, fish, birds, animals and man).

23—24 Lighting candles etc. 25 33 Friday evening meal (including

blessing children, making Kid-dush and Hamotzi, singing Zemi-ros and also words of part of Kiddush and part of Tzur Mi-shelo).

54—48 Youth service on Shabbos morning (mainly taking out the Torah, laining and returning Torah to Ark; also words of extracts from the corresponding prayers).

49-52 Shabbos afternoon activities.

53 Havdoloh

54 Conclusion caption.

55—59 Words of Havdoloh, Shir Hama-alos and Zemiros for Shabbos and Motzaei Shabbos.

The naration gives a script often in fair detail to be read whilst showing each frame.

Comments and Criticisms
The photography in this filmstrip is generally speaking not very clear (e.g. in frame 28 it is difficult to see that the father is holding a Kiddush cup and in frame 50 how many Challos there are on the table). Also some of the photographs tend to be too cluttered (e.g. in frame 25 it is difficult to distinguish the candles from the fruit!)

The frames (in art work) which show the week of creation are presented in a manner which is only suitable for younger children. There are no numbers on the frames and hence some difficulty may be experienced in matching them up with the narration.

This aid (a slightly incomplete set) is on loan from the Council of Christian and Jews, 41 Cadogan Gardens, London, S.W.3. to the J.N.F. Education Department and it can be viewed or borrowed from the latter.

There are 32 slides which are in colour photography. These are accompanied by a record (TBS 609) in German of speed 33½ r.p.m. and of duration: side 1 — 15 minutes, side 2 — 14 minutes. Most of the record is talking with very little singing. There is also an accompanying booklet in German, which gives the text of this record.

The slides show scenes taking place in the home and in the Synagogue on Shabbos with several of the slides showing historical cerem-onial objects.

2-4 The Shabbos table, lighting candles, an old Shabbos lamp.
6-7 Blessing children, Kiddush cup.
9-12 Synagouse, congregations etc.
14-23 Seenes of the Ark, Ark cover, Sifrei Torah and adornments for Sefer Torah.

The record consists almost entirely of reading (in German) the text of the booklet. The first side also includes a brief extract from Kiddush and the second side includes brief extracts of both laining and Yigdal.

Comments and Criticisms

Comments and Criticums

The slides in this aid are on the whole very clear. However, the scenes depicting Shabbos in the home seem to convey very little information with important things such as the making of Kiddush, washing the hands. Hamotti, earling the Shabbos meals etc. being completely absent. Furthermore, the scenes in the Synagogue are better illustrated in other audio visual aids.

Since the accompanying record is in German, it would be necessary for the teacher to prepare a suitable narration to explain the various slides or alternatively a translation of the record could be prepared.
